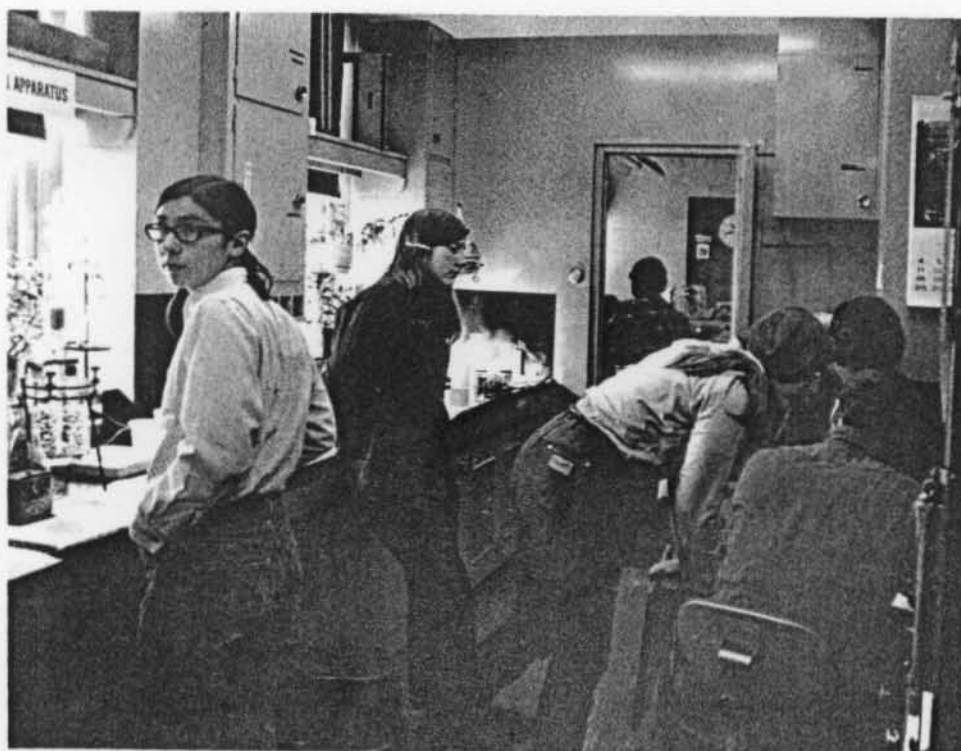

STUDENTS STUDY-WORK



The beehive of activity you may have noticed in the laboratories of the Bigelow Building is due to the arrival of 10 science majors from Middlebury College who are spending their January winter term at WHOI. The students include Pat and Sue Cashman of Providence, Rhode Island; Anne Gilbert of St. Louis, Missouri; Suzanne Webel of Scarsdale, New York; Will Aubrey of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania; Dan Carillo of Montpelier, Vermont; Paul Carroll of Rochester, New York; Frank Gutowski of Rutherford, New Jersey; Matthew Higgins of St. Louis, Missouri; and Moore Newell of Calgary, Alberta. They are all participating in an applied course, which involves the analysis of marine sediments. The course was arranged by their professor, Dr. David W. Folger, formerly at WHOI and now a member of the Geology Department at Middlebury and by Dr. John Schlee of the U. S. Geological Survey and WHOI. In addition to those participating in the course, an additional student, Fred Shepardson, is spending the term as an employee of WHOI. He is developing computer programs for Dr. Derek Spencer.

"THE OCEAN WORLD"

The Ocean World, Joint Oceanographic Assembly, will be held in Tokyo from September 14-25, 1970. The Assembly is being sponsored by and will incorporate meetings of the Commission on Marine Geology of the International Union of Geological Sciences (CMG/IUGS), the International Association of Biological Oceanography (IABO), the International Association of Physical Sciences of the Ocean of the International Union of Geodesy and Geophysics (IAPSO/IUGG), and the Scientific Committee on Oceanic Research of the International Council of Scientific Unions (SCOR/ICSU). Local arrangements are being made by the Japanese Arrangements Committee, Professor M. Uda, Chairman, c/o Geophysical Institute, University of Tokyo, Hongo, Tokyo, Japan.

United States participation is being coordinated jointly by the Committee on Oceanography of the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council and the American Geophysical Union. Several special symposia are being organized by the sponsoring organizations. Papers to be presented at these are by invitation from the symposium organizer. Contributed papers also will be accepted via the appropriate sponsoring organization. The titles and abstracts of all papers to be contributed by US authors should be sent to:

If security requirements deny this, I shall understand.

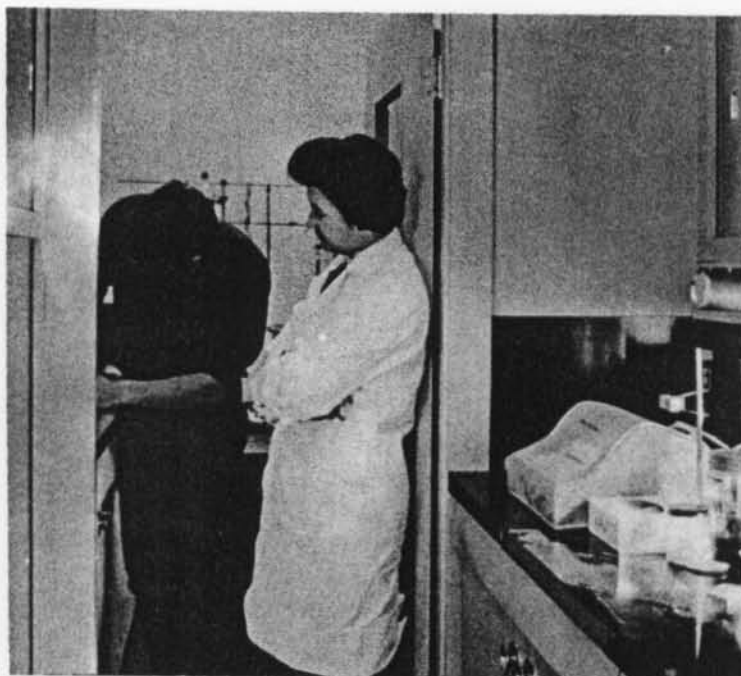

The sediments being analyzed by the group were collected last summer by members of the joint USGS-WHOI program, such as Drs. Bob Meade, John Schlee, John Milliman, Charlie Hollister, and Dave Folger; and summer students including Rick Burroughs, Brian Trucholke, Joe McIlvaine, and Chris Lambertson.

The students started out their visit with a trip to Boston aboard the ATLANTIS II and all returned with glowing reports of Captain Hiller's excellent hospitality.



Since that time, with the exception of lectures and field trips, the students have been working in the labs. The competence which they developed rapidly to operate the sophisticated equipment was due, Dave Folger says, mainly to the able direction and guidance of Mrs. Lois Toner.
